**A BILL FOR**

1 An Act relating to the training and certification of designated  
2 security personnel working at commercial establishments with a  
3 liquor control license or wine or beer permit.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

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HF 141

1 Section 1. Section 123.3, subsection 12A, Code 2005, is  
2 amended to read as follows:

3 12A. "Designated security employee" means an agent,  
4 contract employee, independent contractor, servant, or  
5 employee of a licensee or permittee who is-primarily-employed  
6 for-security-purposes works in a security position in any  
7 capacity at a commercial establishment licensed or permitted  
8 under this chapter.

9 Sec. 2. Section 123.32, subsection 4, Code 2005, is  
10 amended to read as follows:

11 4. SECURITY EMPLOYEE TRAINING. A local authority, as a  
12 condition of obtaining and holding a license or permit for on-  
13 premises consumption, may require a designated security  
14 employee as defined in section 123.3 to be trained and  
15 certified in security methods. The training shall include but  
16 is not limited to mediation techniques, civil rights or unfair  
17 practices awareness as provided in section 216.7, and  
18 providing instruction on the proper physical restraint methods  
19 used against a person who has become combative.

20 EXPLANATION

21 This bill relates to a liquor control licensee or wine or  
22 beer permittee who employs security personnel at a commercial  
23 establishment. The bill expands the definition of "designated  
24 security employee" to include contract employees, independent  
25 contractors, and servants, and any other agent or employee who  
26 works in a security position in any capacity at the commercial  
27 establishment. The bill and current law permit a local  
28 authority to require a "designated security employee" to be  
29 trained and certified in proper security methods.

30 The bill also provides that a city or county may, as a  
31 condition for holding a liquor control license or wine or beer  
32 permit for on-premises consumption, require a designated  
33 security employee to be trained and certified in proper  
34 security methods. Current law provides that a city or county  
35 may, as a condition for obtaining a liquor control license or

1 wine or beer permit, require trained and certified security  
2 personnel.

AN ACT

RELATING TO THE TRAINING AND CERTIFICATION OF DESIGNATED SECURITY PERSONNEL WORKING AT COMMERCIAL ESTABLISHMENTS WITH A LIQUOR CONTROL LICENSE OR WINE OR BEER PERMIT.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

Section 1. Section 123.3, subsection 12A, Code 2005, is amended to read as follows:

12A. "Designated security employee" means an agent, contract employee, independent contractor, servant, or employee of a licensee or permittee who is-primarily-employed for-security-purposes works in a security position in any capacity at a commercial establishment licensed or permitted under this chapter.

Sec. 2. Section 123.32, subsection 4, Code 2005, is amended to read as follows:

4. SECURITY EMPLOYEE TRAINING. A local authority, as a condition of obtaining and holding a license or permit for on-premises consumption, may require a designated security employee as defined in section 123.3 to be trained and certified in security methods. The training shall include but is not limited to mediation techniques, civil rights or unfair practices awareness as provided in section 216.7, and
