**A BILL FOR**

1 An Act creating the Iowa proprietary tuition grant program, and  
2 adding a member to represent proprietary institutions to the  
3 college student aid commission.

1 Section 1. Section 261.1, subsection 5, Code 2005, is  
2 amended to read as follows:

3 5. Eight Nine additional members to be appointed by the  
4 governor. One of the members shall be selected to represent  
5 private colleges, private universities and private junior  
6 colleges located in the state of Iowa. When appointing this  
7 member, the governor shall give careful consideration to any  
8 person or persons nominated or recommended by any organization  
9 or association of some or all private colleges, private  
10 universities and private junior colleges located in the state  
11 of Iowa. One of the members shall be selected to represent  
12 proprietary institutions located in the state of Iowa. One of  
13 the members shall be selected to represent community colleges  
14 located in the state of Iowa. When appointing this member,  
15 the governor shall give careful consideration to any person or  
16 persons nominated or recommended by any organization or  
17 association of Iowa community colleges. One member shall be  
18 enrolled as a student at a board of regents institution,  
19 community college, or accredited private institution. One  
20 member shall be a representative of a lending institution  
21 located in this state. One member shall be a representative  
22 of the Iowa student loan liquidity corporation. The other  
23 three members, none of whom shall be official board members or  
24 trustees of an institution of higher learning or of an  
25 association of institutions of higher learning, shall be  
26 selected to represent the general public.

27 Sec. 2. Section 261.2, subsection 2, Code Supplement 2005,  
28 is amended to read as follows:

29 2. Administer the tuition grant program and proprietary  
30 tuition grant program under this chapter.

31 Sec. 3. Section 261.9, subsection 1, paragraph b, Code  
32 Supplement 2005, is amended to read as follows:

33 b. Is accredited by the north central association of  
34 colleges and secondary schools accrediting agency based on  
35 their requirements, is exempt from taxation under section

1 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, and annually provides  
2 a matching aggregate amount of institutional financial aid  
3 equal to at least seventy-five percent of the amount received  
4 in a fiscal year by the institution's students for Iowa  
5 tuition grant assistance under this chapter. Commencing with  
6 the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2006, the matching aggregate

29 to at least seventy-five percent of the amount received in a

15 Sec. 6. NEW SECTION. 261.18 PROPRIETARY TUITION GRANTS.

16 1. A proprietary tuition grant program is established to  
17 be administered by the commission.

18 2. A proprietary tuition grant may be awarded to a  
19 resident of Iowa who is admitted and in attendance as a full-  
20 time or part-time resident student at an accredited  
21 proprietary institution, establishes financial need, and, in  
22 accordance with the rules and regulations of the commission,  
23 meets the following conditions:

24 a. Completes and files an application for a proprietary  
25 tuition grant.

26 b. Provides for the submission of the parents'  
27 confidential statement for processing, the processed  
28 information to be returned both to the commission and to the  
29 proprietary institution in which the applicant is enrolling.

30 c. Reports promptly to the commission any information  
31 requested.

32 d. Files a new application and parents' confidential  
33 statement annually, on the basis of which the applicant's  
34 eligibility for a renewed proprietary tuition grant will be  
35 evaluated and determined.

1 3. A qualified full-time resident student may receive  
2 state financial aid in the form of proprietary tuition grants  
3 or Iowa tuition grants for not more than eight semesters of  
4 undergraduate study or the trimester or quarter equivalent. A  
5 qualified part-time resident student may receive proprietary  
6 tuition grants or Iowa tuition grants for not more than  
7 sixteen semesters of undergraduate study or the trimester or  
8 quarter equivalent.

9 4. The amount of a proprietary tuition grant to a  
10 qualified full-time student for the fall and spring semesters,  
11 or the trimester or quarter equivalent, shall be the amount of  
12 the student's financial need for that period. However, a  
13 proprietary tuition grant shall not exceed the lesser of the  
14 following:

15 a. The total tuition and mandatory fees for that student  
16 for two semesters or the trimester or quarter equivalent, less  
17 the base amount determined annually by the commission, which  
18 base amount shall be within ten dollars of the average tuition  
19 for two semesters or the trimester or quarter equivalent of  
20 undergraduate study at the state universities under the  
21 control of the board of regents, but in any event the base  
22 amount shall not be less than four hundred dollars.

23 b. For the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2006, and for  
24 each succeeding fiscal year, four thousand dollars.

25 5. The amount of a proprietary tuition grant to a  
26 qualified full-time student for the summer semester or  
27 trimester or quarter equivalent shall be one-half the amount  
28 of the proprietary tuition grant the student receives under  
29 subsection 4.

30 6. The amount of a proprietary tuition grant to a  
31 qualified part-time student enrolled in a course of study  
32 including at least three semester hours but fewer than twelve  
33 semester hours for the fall, spring, and summer semesters, or  
34 the trimester or quarter equivalent, shall be equal to the  
35 amount of a proprietary tuition grant that would be paid to a

1 full-time student times a number which represents the number  
2 of hours in which the part-time student is actually enrolled  
3 divided by twelve semester hours, or the trimester or quarter  
4 equivalent.

5 7. A proprietary tuition grant shall be awarded on an  
6 annual basis. Payments under the grant shall be allocated  
7 equally among the semesters, trimesters, or quarters and shall  
8 be paid at the beginning of each semester, trimester, or  
9 quarter upon certification by the accredited proprietary  
10 institution that the student is admitted and in attendance.  
11 If the student discontinues attendance before the end of any  
12 semester, trimester, or quarter after receiving payment under  
13 the grant, the entire amount of any refund due that student,  
14 up to the amount of any payments made under the annual grant,  
15 shall be paid by the proprietary institution to the state.

16 8. If a student receives financial aid under any other  
17 program, the full amount of such financial aid shall be  
18 considered part of the student's financial resources available  
19 in determining the amount of the student's financial need for  
20 that period. In no case may the state's total financial  
21 contribution to the student's education, including financial  
22 aid under any other state program, exceed the tuition and  
23 mandatory fees at the proprietary institution the student  
24 attends.

25 9. The commission shall administer this program and shall  
26 do the following:

27 a. Provide application forms and parents' confidential  
28 statement forms.

29 b. Adopt rules and regulations for determining financial  
30 need, defining tuition and mandatory fees, defining residence  
31 for the purposes of this section, processing and approving  
32 applications for proprietary tuition grants, and determining  
33 priority of grants. The commission may provide for proration  
34 of funds if the available funds are insufficient to pay all  
35 approved grants. Such proration shall take primary account of

1 the financial need of the applicant. In determining who is a  
2 resident of Iowa, the commission's rules shall be at least as  
3 restrictive as those of the board of regents.

4 c. Approve and award proprietary tuition grants.

5 d. Make an annual report to the governor and general  
6 assembly, and evaluate the proprietary tuition grant program  
7 for the period. The commission may require a proprietary  
8 institution to promptly furnish any information which the  
9 commission may request in connection with the proprietary  
10 tuition grant program.

11 EXPLANATION

12 This bill creates the Iowa proprietary tuition grant  
13 program for students who are enrolled in and attending for-  
14 profit, proprietary postsecondary institutions. The program  
15 is modeled after the Iowa tuition grant program. The bill  
16 adds to the membership of the college student aid commission a  
17 member selected to represent proprietary institutions located  
18 in Iowa.

19 DEFINITIONS. The bill defines "proprietary tuition grant"  
20 and changes the definition of "tuition grant" to provide that  
21 the term does not include a proprietary tuition grant. The  
22 bill defines "proprietary institution" as a for-profit  
23 institution located in Iowa which is not tax-exempt, operated  
24 privately, is accredited by the north central association of  
25 colleges and secondary schools accrediting agency, and  
26 annually provides a matching aggregate amount of institutional  
27 financial aid in the same percentage amounts required of  
28 accredited private institutions whose students are eligible  
29 for the Iowa tuition grant.

30 REQUIREMENTS. The institutions must file annual reports  
31 with the commission and, like accredited private institutions,  
32 promote equal opportunity and affirmative action efforts in  
33 the recruitment, appointment, assignment, and advancement of  
34 personnel at the institution; adopt a policy that prohibits  
35 unlawful possession, use, or distribution of controlled

1 substances by students and employees on property owned or  
2 leased by the institution or in conjunction with activities  
3 sponsored by the institution; develop and implement a written  
4 policy addressing sexual abuse; and adopt a policy to offer  
5 certain specified options to students who are members of the  
6 Iowa national guard or reserve forces of the United States and  
7 who are ordered to state military service or federal service  
8 or duty.

9 STATE FINANCIAL AID LIMITATION. The bill provides that a  
10 qualified full-time resident student may receive state  
11 financial aid in the form of proprietary tuition grants or  
12 Iowa tuition grants for not more than eight semesters of  
13 undergraduate study or the trimester or quarter equivalent.  
14 The bill also provides similar language limiting the amount of  
15 state financial aid qualified part-time resident students may  
16 receive to not more than 16 semesters of undergraduate study  
17 or the trimester or quarter equivalent.

7 unlawful possession, use, or distribution of controlled  
8 substances by students and employees on property owned or  
9 leased by the institution or in conjunction with activities  
10 sponsored by the institution; develop and implement a written  
11 policy addressing sexual abuse; and adopt a policy to offer  
12 certain specified options to students who are members of the  
13 Iowa national guard or reserve forces of the United States and  
14 who are ordered to state military service or federal service  
15 or duty.

16     **STATE FINANCIAL AID LIMITATION.** The bill provides that a  
17 qualified full-time resident student may receive state  
18 financial aid in the form of proprietary tuition grants or  
19 Iowa tuition grants for not more than eight semesters of  
20 undergraduate study or the trimester or quarter equivalent.  
21 The bill also provides similar language limiting the amount of  
22 state financial aid qualified part-time resident students may  
23 receive to not more than 16 semesters of undergraduate study  
24 or the trimester or quarter equivalent.
